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Long-Term Strategic Plan: *Hand Ups Replace Hand Outs*

In 2016 the Board of Trustees embarked on a mission to discern the capabilities of our organization and the needs of the community in order to map the future for Valley Interfaith Food & Clothing (as it was known at the time).

During this yearlong process, the team developed a 3-5 year Vision for what they felt Valley Interfaith could be and what it's impact in our community can be as it related to the area of poverty and generational poverty cycle.

Immediately the team realized that the name of this institution did not fully represent these hopes and goals and as a result, Valley Interfaith Food & Clothing is now Valley Interfaith Community Resource Center.

This name change succinctly states the vision of the Long-Term Strategic Plan as it accurately reflects our desire to be of service to the underserved in the Mill Creek Valley Community, and to serve as a Resource for the families and individuals who call it home. This idea of being a Resource reframes our efforts from 'giving a (hu)man a fish' to 'teaching a (hu) man to fish' thereby empowering people to take ownership of their lives and mentally move from a state of constant victimhood and powerlessness to being in control of their lives and future.

With this new vision; Valley Interfaith Community Resource Center is expanding it's external partnerships, restructuring its programs such as Emergency Resources and adding additional service models for Victim Advocacy, Crisis Prevention and Programs to teach Sustainability.

Hand outs rob people of their power—hand ups honor a person's right to own their direction and life. Hand ups provide support and guidance on the hike and empower the hiker to take necessary steps to summit their mountain.


I have spent 27 years in the nonprofit arena and never have I been so excited about the possibilities of service like I am about Valley and our new Vision.

Another client, Julie, is a mother of 3 children while still working 55—60 hours per week and just treading water. "Valley is giving me hope and a place to help me start thinking about a future, not just for myself, but for my three kids who need and deserve more."
